The Pacing Guide is a resource to support your year-long planning. The units can be taught in any order. In most units, the lessons build on one another. Therefore, we strongly recommend the lessons within each unit are taught in the sequence they are presented. They include assessments and a curated collection of additional activity suggestions, online resources, project ideas, and readings.

Students discover that the Sun's path changes with the seasons, as does the time of sunrise and sunset. The Sun is always highest in the sky at noon, but that height changes with the season.

Students define the problem that a town needs protection from flooding. They design solutions using different types of flood protection. Students realize that flooding is caused by severe rainfall generated by hurricanes. Hurricanes are created where ocean temperatures are warm.
